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LESSON PLAN

HARMONY MEETS THE WORLD, BOOK 3: HAPPY DIWALI!

When Harmony finds a diya, a clay oil lamp, hidden inside the mysterious treasure box, she examines it through her magical binoculars and is instantly transported to New Delhi, India where she is welcomed by Nakul and Shubra, a brother and sister duo, who have invited Harmony to spend Diwali with their family.

Upon Arrival, Harmony learns the origins of Diwali and how it honors the return home of the Hindu god, Lord Rama. During her visit, Harmony helps the family prepare their house for Diwali from creating a beautiful rangoli to cleaning their home so Lakshmi, the goddess of good fortune, can enter. Plus, they indulge in making sweet treats like Pista Burfi.


In the midst of the activities, Nakul suspects Shubra has stolen his prized treasure. Also, when Shubra starts spending more time with Harmony than with her brother. Nakul feels left out and gets even more upset with Shubra. Can Harmony help Subra make amends with Nakul and spread the joyous Diwali spirit?

- STUDENTS WILL BE ABLE TO EXPLAIN INDIAN CELEBRATIONS FROM THE STORY.
- STUDENTS WILL BE ABLE TO POINT OUT INDIA ON A WORLD MAP OR GLOBE.
- STUDENTS WILL PRACTICE SOLVING PROBLEMS WHICH OCCUR IN FAMILY AND COMMUNITY LIFE.
- STUDENTS WILL DEVELOP STRATEGIES TO USE IN DIFFICULT SITUATIONS.
- STUDENTS WILL BE ABLE TO CREATE ARTWORK USING RADIAL SYMMETRY.
- STUDENTS WILL EXAMINE AND DIFFERENTIATE BETWEEN CITY LIFE IN INDIA AND CITY LIFE IN THE USA
- .STUDENTS WILL GATHER INTERESTING FACTS ABOUT FIREFLIES IN A SHORT RESEARCH ACTIVITY (BIOLUMINESCENCE OR "LIVING LIGHT", WHERE THEY LIVE, ENDANGERED SPECIES, ETC.)
- STUDENTS WILL BE ABLE TO DISCUSS SYMBOLS AND THEIR MEANINGS.







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LESSON PLAN

HARMONY MEETS THE WORLD, BOOK 3: HAPPY DIWALI!

LEARNING ACTIVITIES

- Read the book together or in groups. List new or difficult words on the board, decode them and have the students add them to their vocabulary list.
- POINT OUT CALIFORNIA AND INDIA ON THE WORLD MAP OR GLOBE. COMPARE THE TWO BY SIZE, LANDMARKS, AND GEOGRAPHY. ASK "HAS ANYONE BEEN TO INDIA OR DO YOU KNOW SOMEONE WHO HAS?" "WHAT DO YOU ALREADY KNOW ABOUT INDIA?"
- Discuss the preparations the family is making for their Diwali celebration. Compare and contrast them with your own family holiday activities. Ask: "Can you find any similarities between Nakul's and Shubra's holiday and yours? (preparing special food, cleaning and decorating, gift giving, etc..)
- For reading comprehension, read out loud a passage from the book that presents an interesting situation (Chapter 5, for example). Have the students discuss: the main idea or conflict; what it reminds them of; which characters are using emotions, actions, or the appearance of things to understand the situation; what would each student do to solve this conflict?
- Discuss mindfulness (being in the present) and how it can help calm things down. Sit in a circle on chairs or on the floor. Instruct the children to take deep breaths in through their nose and to exhale slowly through the nose (for one to two minutes). Have them place their hand on their heart to notice the beat. Now ask them to think of a friend or sibling for whom they are grateful. Encourage them to send kind thoughts to them and hold them in their hearts. This is called heartfulness. They can also send kind wishes in a letter or drawing.
- As an art project, create "Happy Diwali" cards for your special friends, siblings, mom or dad, etc. (See "Happy Diwali Cards" activity on this website).


HARMONY MEETS THE WORLD, BOOK 3: HAPPY DIWALI!

- INTRODUCE RADIAL BALANCE BY HAVING THE STUDENTS CREATE THEIR OWN RANGOLI. IT MIGHT BE NICE TO GO OUTSIDE TO CREATE RANGOLIS AS SIDEWALK CHALK ART. START THE DESIGN FROM THE CENTER AND WORK OUTWARDS. TAKE PICTURES OF EACH RANGOLI BEFORE IT RAINS! (SEE "CREATING RANGOLIS" ON THIS WEBSITE.)
- Have the students do a short science research project on fireflies and their ability to create light and why are they becoming endangered.
- Discuss the Rickshaw as one of the modes of transportation in India. Do we have anything similar to it in the USA? What other modes of transportation are used in India? Do a short social studies research project on it.
- DEFINE SYMBOLS. SYMBOLS CAN BE WORDS, OBJECTS, OR IMAGES THAT HAVE A SPECIAL MEANING. Make a list of all the symbols found in the book and have students try to create meanings for each. Make sure they search the illustrations for symbols as well. [peacock(harmony), elephant(good luck),light (wisdom), darkness (ignorance) flowers (beauty), Diwali (joy and peace), fireworks (victory of good over evil), diyas (light over dark), rangoli (welcome), etc.] Each culture interprets symbols in different ways. It is beneficial to allow children to be creative with the meanings, you will get several ideas for each symbol and multiple perspectives. This is a step toward intellectual growth.


3. Harmony wants to buy two bags of mixed seeds. Each bag costs 350 rupees. How many rupees does Harmony need?

5. Harmony bought two times as many pistachios as Shubra. If Shubra bought 4 bags of pistachios, how many did Harmony buy?







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


MATH AND ART ACTIVITY

LEARNING OBJECTIVES:

- STUDENTS WILL BE ABLE TO IDENTIFY PARTS OF A CIRCLE: CENTER, RADIUS, DIAMETER, CIRCUMFERENCE AND SECTOR.
- STUDENTS WILL USE RADIAL BALANCE IN DESIGN. RADIAL BALANCE IS THE ORGANIZATION OF A DESIGN THAT GROWS FROM A CENTER OUTWARD.
- STUDENTS WILL USE REPETITION IN DESIGN. REPETITION CREATES RHYTHM AND RHYTHM CREATES HARMONY.
- STUDENTS WILL LEARN TO USE A COMPASS AS A TOOL TO CREATE CIRCLES.

ACTIVITY:

• Have the students work in pairs as they practice making circles on a 12 X 18 inch sheet of white construction paper.



• DEMONSTRATE HOW TO HOLD A COMPASS TO CREATE A CIRCLE.








MATH AND ART ACTIVITY

- Ask one student to hold down the point of the compass while the other turns the compass to draw the circle, if needed.
- The point of the compass creates a center, and the pencil mark creates the circumference or edge of the circle. If you draw a line through the center of the circle you will make a diameter.
- HAVE THEM MARK THE CIRCLE WITH A CENTER POINT.
- AFTER PRACTICING, HAVE EACH STUDENT MAKE ONE LARGE CIRCLE, ON A CLEAN PAPER, AT LEAST SIX INCHES IN DIAMETER. HAVE THEM MEASURE THEIR CIRCLE WITH A RULER.
- CUT OUT THE CIRCLE AND FOLD IT IN HALF.










1. FOLD IT INTO QUARTERS.




3. OPEN THE CIRCLE TO SEE EIGHT SECTORS. USING A RULER, DRAW IN THE LINES MADE BY THE FOLDS. 2. FOLD IT ONCE AGAIN IN EIGHTS.



4. Now create a rangoli pattern by repeating the same design in all eight sectors. [Repetition] Start in the center and draw outward towards the circumference. Use the same shapes in every sector.



VARIATIONS: CREATE THE SAME SHAPE IN EVERY OTHER SECTOR. ADD LINES WITH A RULER. DRAW IN MORE CIRCLES. USE STENCILS, IF AVAILABLE.

- COLOR IN THE RANGOLI USING CRAYONS, COLORED PENCILS OR MARKERS.
- Ask the students to write out the parts of the circle on the back of their rangolis.



EVALUATION:

- DISPLAY THE FINISHED RANGOLIS IN A PROMINENT PLACE (BULLETIN BOARD, WALL, HALLWAY, ETC.) ASK THE CHILDREN TO POINT OUT EACH PART OF THE CIRCLE IN THEIR DESIGNS: CENTER, RADIUS, DIAMETER, CIRCUMFERENCE, SECTOR.
- WHAT DO THE CHILDREN THINK ABOUT THEIR RANGOLIS?
- RANGOLIS ARE MEANT TO WELCOME SOMEONE. ASK WHERE THEY WILL PLACE THEIR RANGOLI (BEDROOM DOOR, FRONT DOOR, IN A WINDOW) AND WHO THEY INTEND TO WELCOME.







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

PEACOCK RANGOLI






- STUDENTS WILL USE THE TECHNIQUES OF COLLAGE AND MIXED MEDIA IN DESIGN.
- STUDENTS WILL FOCUS ON USING DIWALI SYMBOLS IN THEIR WORK.
- STUDENTS WILL USE MINDFULNESS AND HEARTFULNESS BY KEEPING IN MIND THE RECIPIENT OF THE CARD AS THEY WORK.

- CREATE A COLLAGE BY CUTTING OUT SHAPES AND PICTURES TO GLUE ONTO THE FRONT OF EACH CARD. Use one or more Diwali symbols in your collage. Elephant-royalty, good luck
 Peacock-happiness, harmony
 Flowers-purity, beauty
 Diyas-light over darkness
 Coins-fortune
 Rangolis-welcome
 Firecrackers/Sparklers-victory of good over evil, celebration
 - Sweets-sweet relationships between friends and family.
- Use a mixed media technique by using a variety of materials in creating the card.
- On the inside, create a sentiment, poem, phrase or a drawing to dedicate the card to someone. [Example: "May the festival of lights brighten every part of your life."] Diwali is a time for love, respect and tolerance for family and friends.




